But I'm not just talking about a trip to the groomers. How about a mental fresh start?

Don't be too alarmed if your dog's a bit wound up this spring. Aren't we all a little anxious to get out and do something after the long winter? We're also likely to be a bit rusty with some of our favorite hobbies that we've been absent from doing during the winter months, and that includes working with our dogs.

So let's see a show of hands — who has been working diligently throughout the winter with their dog...congratulations to both of you. As for the rest of us, it's time to get to work. For those that have been through training, I'm sure your trainer would be more than happy to give you a refresher course. For those looking for a dog trainer, I have a few suggestions.

There is an old saying that goes, "The only thing two dog trainers can agree on is what the third dog trainer's doing wrong." Although there may be some truth to this, the fact is, most trainers use the same basic theories and techniques with their own personal touches. We are very fortunate in the Lincoln and surrounding areas

to have a large selection of competent trainers to choose from. Simply pick two or three and do interviews to see who you feel most comfortable with.

For those that need a jump start, we will be having a twopart seminar in April entitled, "Building a Solid Foundation". It will consist of two, 90-minute sessions that will include lecture and hands-on, one-on-one work with you and your dog. We will cover understanding dog behavior, reading the body language of your dog, how to motivate your dog, and getting started with some solid foundation exercises. Every well-built structure has a solid foundation.

Training Tips on a Well Behaved Dog: Dog Training 101

Dog training is simple — not to be confused with easy. It takes love, patience, time, willingness and perseverance.

The two main components to dog training are consistency and timing. First, let's talk about consistency. Consistency is an absolute must. It is not fair to the dog, nor should we expect the dog to learn if we are changing the rules all the time. For example, what if they changed the speed limit on the street we take to work every day and didn't post the change? See what I mean?

I never give the dog a command unless I am willing, and prepared, to follow through with the appropriate correction to make it happen the first time I give it. I never repeat a command. Note, I said command, not request. I never ask my dog to do anything. I tell my dog what to do. I love my dog! But I am Master, and dog is dog, and the sooner we make that clear the better. Secondly, you'll notice I give the command once. If I'm constantly repeating my commands without enforcing them, why should the dog do it the first time, or second, or perhaps at all?

In a nutshell, I give the dog a command once, enforce it, and reward the dog. The dog learns that there is no choice, it must do it, and the quicker it does it, the quicker it gets its reward. And this will become a habit that the dog will continue throughout training.

The importance of timing; dogs live in the moment, perhaps something we humans should try more often. The timing of our corrections, as well as our praise and reward, is crucial, and sometimes there are only moments between the correction and the reward.

Let's use a common problem as an example: dog jumping up on you. In this case the correction, a firm NO, should come as the dog is jumping up, as well as a leash correction or perhaps a knee. Now, just a moment later as the dog is sitting in front of you, it should get praise and a reward.

If I am consistent with this, the dog will learn to avoid the negative consequences of jumping up, and instead, try to do the behavior that will result in positive consequences.

In closing, RELAX, dog training is a joy, not a burden. Done properly it is fun, and will increase the bond between you and your furry friend.

New Remedies for Thunderstorm Phobia

As Spring approaches, thunderstorms can't be far behind. For many dogs and dog owners this can be a stressful time of year. Fear of thunder, fireworks and any loud noises can induce anxiety in some dogs. If your pet suffers from this you know the signs all too well: pacing, panting, hiding and frequently destructive behavior, usually when trying to escape the noise. Not only can this cause property damage, but it can also cause injury to the dog.

Fortunately, there are new products and techniques to help these stressed out dogs.

- Keep calm. Your dog takes many behavior cues from you. When a storm approaches, keep calm, and adhere to your routine. If your dog starts to get "wound up", don't pet and cuddle; this reinforces that behavior. On the other hand, never discipline or yell at the dog for his behavior. It will further escalate his anxiety. Try to distract the dog if possible, by playing with a favorite toy.
- 2. Safe place. Some dogs feel safer in a den-like area; a kennel, basement, bathroom, under the bed. Also if you plan to leave your dog unattended, clear the area of things that the dog could destroy or somehow injure himself with.
- 3. DAP (Dog Appeasing Phermone) mimics the effects of the phermones released from a canine nursing mother and provides a calming, soothing effect. This is available in an extended release collar, spray, and room diffuser.
- 4. Body wraps provide constant gentle pressure and make dogs feel more secure. Thundershirts and Anxiety wraps are available from many pet supply stores, veterinarians and online. They are safe and easy to use.
- 5. Homeopathic medications are now available for thunderstorm anxiety. These usually work best in dogs with mild symptoms.

Your veterinarian is your best source for advice on managing thunderstorm phobia. Some severe cases may require prescription medications to manage your dog's problem.

Don't take thunderstorm phobia lightly, even if the problem seems minor in your dog. Handled badly by owners, it can get worse, and dogs have been known to jump through glass windows during storms, and some have fled fenced yards. This is a major problem that calls for intelligent handling at the first sign.

There is no one answer for managing storm phobia; usually it will take a combination of products and techniques. However, a caring owner working with their veterinarian can make spring thunderstorms a less stressful time for dogs and owners.


Once construction has started you will be able to follow its progress on our website. Thanks to everyone who has helped get us to this point.
